Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP) During World War II National WASP WWII Museum

A woman reading a magazine in the lounge of a nurse's barracked helped change history forever.

Millions of lives were saved.

In short, the unwavering bravery of two Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP) at Eglin Air Force Base outside of Pensacola, Florida played a crucial part in ending the bloodiest conflict the world had ever seen.

It was estimated that one million Americans would lose their lives in an invasion of mainland Japan during World War II. Five to ten million Japanese would die defending it.

Secretly, the United States worked on the Manhatten Project to avoid this calamity.

But in June of 1944, as the Allies stormed the beaches of Normandy, there was no way for the United States to deliver the bomb being developed at the Manhatten Project.



That happed to be the same time "Didi" Moorman was sitting in a nurse's barracks, reading a magazine.

Lieutenant Colonel Paul Tibbets, the American hero who would go on to pilot the *Enola*

Gay over Hiroshima, walked in.

Lt Col Tibbets had a big problem. The B-29 Superfortress, the largest bomber the world had ever seen, and the plane equipped to eventually deliver "the bomb," had been a complete mess.

Its Wright engines were nicknamed the "wrong" engines by pilots everywhere, as flaws in the engines caused them to repeatedly overheat and burst into flames while the massive plane was midair.

In fact, renowned test pilot Edmund T. Allen, his eight crewmen, and 19 civilians in a meatprocessing plant outside of Boeing's headquarters in Seattle died because of an engine fire which caused the B-29 to crash.

Some of the bravest men who have ever served our great country simply refused to fly in a B-29, including Tibbets' own handpicked men. So Tibbets ended up in Florida where he found Didi Moorman reading a magazine. He marched right up to her and asked "Do you have any fourengine time?"

Didi did not. Her friend Dora Dougherty, also



there at the base, cam the closest. She had flown A-20s, which weren't four-engine aircraft, but at least they were medium-range bombers.

Didi and Dora were two of the 25,000 women who applied to be WASP when the U.S. military put out the call for female pilots. Only 1,800 were accepted into the program. Just over a thousand graduated.

The WASP played a vital role in the war effort by flying planes from factories to airbases, by towing targets for anti-aircraft training, by testpiloting experimental aircraft, and by training male pilots.

They were subject to military discipline and military conditions. They are the only unit that flew every type of aircraft—from bombers like the B-24 to fighters like the P-51 Mustang.

In total, the WASP flew over 60 million miles, and 38 of them made the ultimate sacrifice, giving their lives for their country.

While the male pilots would not dare get into a B-29, Didi and Dora jumped at the opportunity.

Lt. Colonel Tibbets trained them in 3 days.

When one of the engines caught fire in mid-air, Didi and Dora handled it perfectly. Without missing a beat, they "feathered" the engine, pulled the fire extinguisher, and with the other 3 engines, landed the massive bomber perfectly.

Tibbets knew Didi and Dora were ready for what he had planned and acted quickly.



He had Fifinella, the mascot of the WASP, pained

on the B-29, named the bomber "Ladybird," and sent them off on demonstration flights.



They ferried pilots, crew chiefs and navigators from the heavy-bomber based at Almogordo, New Mexico to other bases across the country.

After a few days, they were ordered to stop.

Male pilots embarrassed by the sight of the massive warbird, which wasn't supposed to be "flyable," touching down on the runway, and two women emerging from the cockpit.

Embarrassed by their timidity compared to the undaunted WASP, male pilots got over their fear quickly. They stopped worrying about the dangers, and began training to fly.

Within a year, the B-29 ended World War II.

It may never have happened with the WASP.

Nonetheless, Didi, Dora, and the rest of the WASP were overlooked and sometimes outright resented during their service.

Much worse, for decades afterwards, these amazing women were forgotten after they served their duty so well and so honorable.

As I mentioned, 38 WASP gave their lives for their country during the war. All of them were denied standard military death benefits. When a "fly girl" died, her sister pilots had to chip in funds to transport the casket home for a proper burial.

After WWII, the WASP were denied all Veterans' benefits, including the GI Bill. Nor were they allowed to join groups like the American Legion.



Yet, none of these slights diminished the desire of these women to serve. Cornelia Fort, the first WASP to give her life for her country, expressed the patriotism of these women best:

"...That we, in a very small way,

are being allowed to help keep the sky free is the most beautiful thing I have ever known. I, for one,

am profoundly grateful that my one talent, my only knowledge, flying, happens to be of use to my country when it is needed."

Unfortunately, it would take decades for these brave, patriotic women to be recognized.

Finally, in 1977, WASP Bee Haydu, Senator Barry Goldwater (a WWII ferry pilot) and Col. Bruce Arnold, the sone of Gen. Hap Arnold, formed a coalition to pass legislation giving the WASP Veteran status, which entitled these women to most of the benefits other Veterans receive.

In 2009, the WASP were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal, the highest civilian honor one can receive.

But even as recently as 2015, when WASP Elane Harmon passed away, her dying wish—to have her ashes placed in Arlington National Cemetery's Columbarium—was denied because of a change by the outgoing Secretary of the Army.

Fortunately, the Harmon family—with the full support of the National WASP WWII Museum— was successfully in getting this policy reversed.

But the whole ordeal demonstrates the ongoing need for recognition.

Which is what the Natioal WASP WWII Museum strives for each and every day at Avenger Field in Sweetwater, Texas, the site of the WASP Training Grounds and our museum dedicated to these brave but little-known Veterans.
